

Welcoming the holy family at school: Posada




What is the posada?

The tradition of 'posada' (Spanish for 'inn') comes from Mexico, where small versions of Mary and Joseph travel around different households in the community and stay at each household for one night. The tradition symbolises welcoming the unborn Christ child into our homes and hearts as we approach the first Christmas night.



Why is it important?

We often fast-forward to the night of Jesus's birth in Bethlehem, dismissing the 90-mile journey that Mary and Joseph would have taken to get there. It would have been difficult and dangerous, with eight hours' travel a day, probably taking over a week. Mary and Joseph would have needed rest, food and drink. They may have stayed at hostels or even camped. The posada encourages children to consider what Mary and Joseph might have experienced on their journey to Bethlehem.



How does it work in school?

The posada tradition is introduced in collective worship and children are invited to welcome Mary, Joseph and the unborn baby Jesus into their classes. Classes are given a few days to discuss, plan, and put together their posada ('inn') in their classroom ready for the holy family's visit.

A timetable is agreed beforehand to plan the posada's journey around the school community. It's good to include the school office, the staff room and the headteacher's office so everyone in the school community is involved!



The posada 'kit' that travels from stop to stop includes:

- An introduction to the journey
- Questions to think about together
- A map showing the route
- Figures of Mary, Joseph and a donkey
- A prayer and a candle
- A timetable for the journey around school
- A blank journal for each class to add an entry recording thoughts, prayers, observations and anything else

Teaching staff choose how to use the posada kit during its visit to their class (eg reflection time, RE lesson etc)





Creating community in school and beyond


Classes are encouraged to add a diary entry and take photos of the posada's visit. These can then be shared during collective worship or a Christmas service so children, staff and families can see the holy family's visit to other parts of the school community. It gives a school-wide focus to getting ready for Christmas, and a collective welcome to Mary, Joseph and baby Jesus.

Use the posada basket however you like to set up a place for them to stay!


