Safeguarding Briefing - 5th May 2025

UPDATED Protective security and preparedness for education settings (DfE)

Updated non-statutory guidance has been released to help schools and other education settings strengthen their preparedness for terrorism and major incidents. It sets out simple, cost-effective steps to safeguard learners, staff, and volunteers through practical planning and a strong security culture.

Drawing on advice from the National Counter-Terrorism Security Office (NaCTSO), the guidance includes editable templates, real-life examples, and interactive resources. It is suitable for early years settings, schools, colleges, alternative provision, and out-of-school settings.

Key Actions for Schools:

- **Appoint a Security Lead** to oversee emergency planning and act as incident lead if needed.
- **Review and test plans** for lockdown, invacuation, evacuation, and bomb threats, ensuring they meet the needs of all learners, including those with SEND.
- **Train all staff** to recognise suspicious behaviour (SCaN), assess suspicious items (HOT protocol), and respond to incidents (RUN HIDE TELL).
- **Use the self-assessment tool** (Annex D) to review current plans and identify gaps.
- **Prepare a 'grab kit'** with essential items to support response efforts, especially for those with additional needs.

All staff are encouraged to read the guidance and familiarise themselves with their role in keeping the school community safe.

UPDATE How to prepare for outdoor education visits that may involve large crowds (OEAP)

The Outdoor Education Advisers' Panel (OEAP) has updated its National Guidance to address the challenges of educational visits involving large crowds. The revised document, 7.2k Group Safety in Crowded Places, offers practical advice for planning visits to events or locations where crowds may gather, such as festivals, sporting events, or busy urban areas.

Key points from the guidance include:

- The need for robust planning and supervision strategies.
- Importance of clear communication before and during the visit.
- Thorough risk assessments tailored to the specific crowd context.
- Contingency plans for emergencies, including lost pupils.
- Recognition of the heightened vulnerability of young people in crowds.
- Encouragement to liaise with event organisers and local authorities where appropriate.

Misrepresentation of Brain Research for Parents - White Hatter

The increase in the use of social media has led to an increase in misrepresentation of facts. This is largely down to the small-snippet format in which most social media content is shaped into. Scientific language is often used to allow for these snippets to be as short as possible. By using scientific language the content becomes more credible and also allows for fewer words to be used, which would otherwise be implemented to gain the trust of the reader.

Since social media is used by all, parents and adults responsible for social care of minors may find themselves influenced by seemingly 'trustworthy' information. However, what is often missing is the peer-reviewed literature that gives such information context and makes it intelligible as part of a wider picture.

As social media usage continues to rise, this phenomena will become more of a problem. White Hatter has recently published an article which explores this issue, and seeks to inform on its prevention. If interested, please follow the link below:

Pornography and the Adolescent Brain - The Reward Foundation

One effect of the increasing use of the internet and the exponential speeding up of broadband speeds has been the expansion of pornography's user base. Pornographic websites and the adult industry more broadly, has become one of the key drivers of internet use.

Its incessant movement to drive user traffic has seen quasi-pornographic material appear on social media sites, in particular Instagram and Tik-Tok. These sites, particularly the latter, are frequented by under-18s due to weak user identification systems and consequent age verification methods. Their viewing of this 'adult' marketing has produced a direct pipeline from social media into pornographic sites and as a result, has produced a generation of minors who can easily access pornography whenever and wherever they like.

This has inspired 'The Reward Foundation' to produce training aimed at informing pupils of the danger of pornography to their mental wellbeing. Across seven free lessons crafted by accredited trainers, they seek to arm schools and pupils with the knowledge they need to avoid falling afoul of this growing danger. Roblox and Parental Controls - South West Grid for Learning

Roblox, the popular minecraft 'style' game has announced a new raft of parental controls. The website which ranks among the most popular games for children in the e-space, has previously been accused of possessing weak child protection tools. Their new raft of adaptations is important due to the game's position among school aged children. The new features have been adopted to allow parents to take control of their children's game time in a more comprehensive manner.

Parents will now be able to block individuals who communicate with their children, as well as have more detailed oversight over their usage of the programme. Real-time awareness measures have been increased and these changes represent a big step forward in making popular multiplayer games more secure for underaged users.
